
CONTRACTORS

If there are folks in the area that do such work, speak up! I know there's work out there for you. Speaking of hauling, Ellenville Lumber rents U-Hauls. They rent at the 'going rate', but much like Ed & Al's Barbershop, local stories are FREE! Ask for Irwin; he'll update you on local happenings, town history, the arts, and good reads, always with a smile!
